Local – Thirteen Shasta County schools will be joining schools from around the world to celebrate International Walk to School Day on Wednesday, October 3, 2012. Local elected officials and principals will be leading students walking to school that day. The events also help to build connections between families, schools and the broader community.

The walk will begin with kids, parents and community leaders gathering at specific locations to walk to school. Prizes will be given to children walking upon arriving at school.

In the U.S., International Walk to School Day is expected to include 5,000 schools from all 50 states. Walkers from the U.S. will join children and adults in 40 countries around the world.

Schools that are participating in Shasta County include:

Alta Mesa, Anderson Heights, Anderson Middle School, Burney, Cypress, Columbia, Manzanita, Millville, Mountain View, Rother, Sycamore, Shasta Lake and Turtle Bay.

Walk to School events work to create safer routes for walking and bicycling and emphasize the importance of issues such as an increase in physical activity among children, pedestrian safety, and a decrease in traffic congestion and air pollution. This event kicks off year round contests to encourage children to walk or ride their bicycles to school at least once a week at several schools. It also compliments the pedestrian safety curriculum, which is being implemented throughout the Redding School District and several other Shasta County schools over the next three years.

The event is organized by the Shasta County Safe Routes to School program, which works with schools in Shasta County to encourage and promote walking and biking to school.
